Rescue Foundation is both a registered Charitable Society and Public Trust that is recognized working for rescue, rehabilitation and repatriation of survivors of human trafficking in India and neighboring countries such as Nepal and Bangladesh since 1999. We are recognized by the Government under Section 21 of the Immoral Trafficking Prevention Act (1956) and The Juvenile Justice Act 2015. We currently manage three Government licensed and funded protective homes which are located in Mumbai, Boisar and Pune in Maharashtra where we provide comprehensive rehabilitation programs for an average of 400 - 500 girls & women each year over the past two decades. Our newest homes has started operations in Delhi. We have trained counselors, social workers, lawyers, doctors, caseworkers to ensure each girl gets holistic support.





Greetings! On behalf of all Rescue Foundation I wish you the very best of what 2020 has to offer. The last 12 months have been an amazing journey for all of us. 2019 started with an incredible operation mounted by our team in Delhi where based on the intimation of a missing person's report from our partners we were able to trace a no of women who were being trafficked from Nepal. The entire operation which involved the authorities and partners across Nepal, Delhi and Manipur led to over a hundred women being rescued before they were trafficked.

The year 2019 ended with the grant of the license by the Authorities for our latest 100 bed protective home for trafficked survivors in Delhi. During the course of the year, Rescue Foundation worked with the Police to undertake over 146 investigations into various criminal networks resulting in 36 operations that saved over 155 survivors of human trafficking and the arrest of 55 perpetrators of the crime. These children and women were trafficked from 19 states across India and from 9 countries across the world to the major cities in India where they were rescued by the joint intervention of the Police and Rescue Foundation. In the area of care and protection our multidisciplinary team at our protective home's cared for over 533 survivors and worked with our partners to restore 535 survivors across India and different parts of the world. We have a total staff strength of 85, our legal team consisting of six lawyers now are currently handling 88 ongoing prosecution cases across India, and now have a team of ten experienced investigators that work closely with our lawyers and the social workers to rescue and restore those affected by Human Trafficking.

Rescue Foundation in 2019 embarked on an exciting initiative with MPOWER, India's leading mental health service provider to extend their specialist support services for our survivors at the Mumbai protective home. We continue to be grateful for all our partners across all our protective homes that we work closely with. In 2019 we also overhauled our human resource and financial control systems. Rescue Foundation now has advanced systems and processes to help us strengthen our internal governance. These changes were attested to by the independent internal auditor "Centre for Promoting Accountability" through their report. We have now incorporated the process of goals and targets linked with performance appraisals and corresponding increments for all our staff. We look forward to continuing the process of higher levels of productivity, high standards of survivor and staff care, stronger internal and external foundations, and deeper partnerships with both the State and other civil society groups. In 2020 we will continue the steady growth of our work through our strategy of tackling human trafficking through an emphasis on investigating and prosecuting human trafficking criminal networks, care and protection of those who are vulnerable or are survivors.

We will then work with safe communities to both prevent human trafficking, reintegrate and restore survivors of the crime by journeying with them as they become pillars within those communities. On behalf of everyone at Rescue Foundation I thank you for supporting and journeying with us through 2019. We would not be able to achieve anything without your encouragement and financial support through all the successes and challenges that we have encountered in our joint quest to tackle trafficking of humans and their subsequent exploitation. I look forward to interacting with each of you in 2020 and would be most grateful for your continued advice, encouragement and financial support for the work of Rescue Foundation.

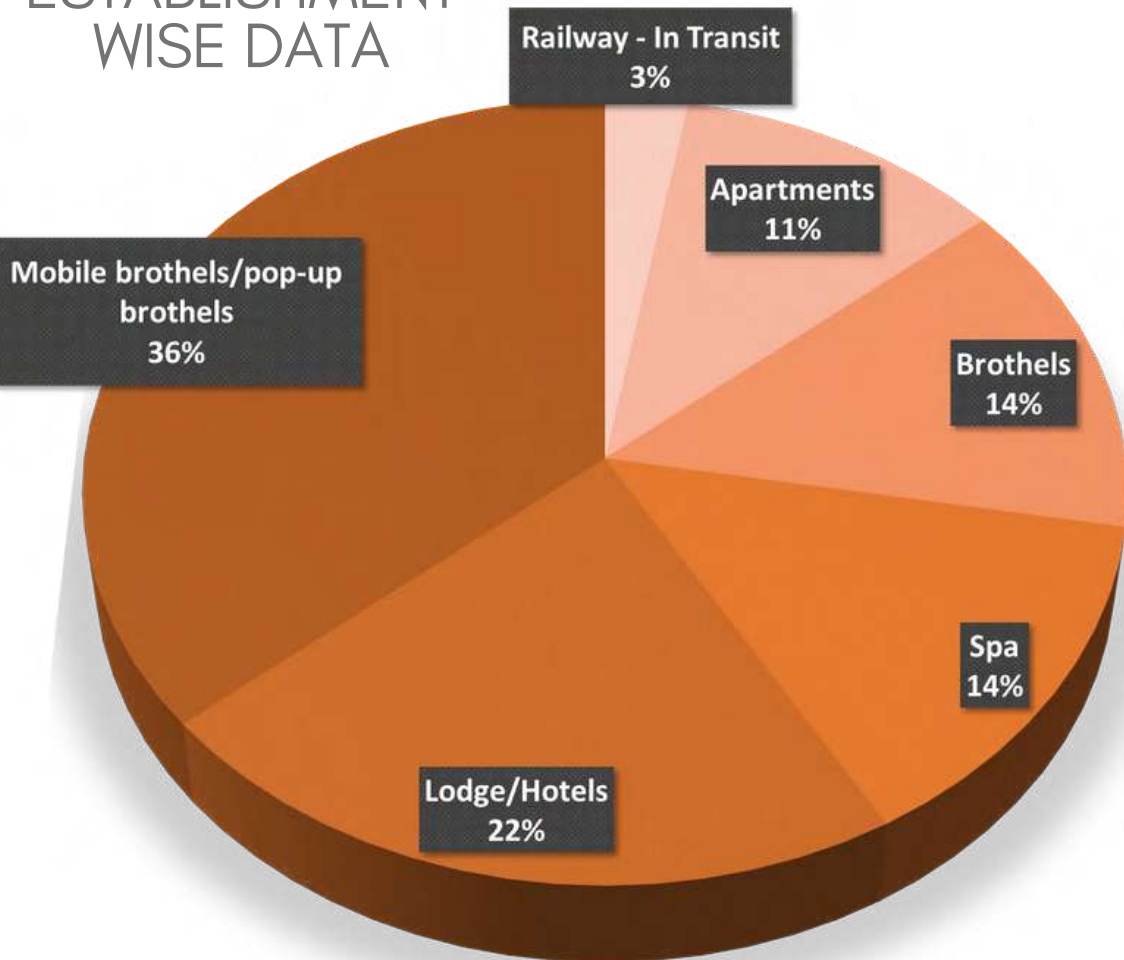

TRAFFICKING HAS CHANGED

Over the past years, we have witnessed a massive transition in how the crime has evolved. Red Light Areas (prostitution zones) had traditionally been the areas where a high number of women and children were trafficked for prostitution and as a result, the police and Non Profits have conducted a number of rescue operations to rescue women and children. Over 2 decades we have observed, criminal networks are now increasingly trafficking women and girls to areas other than the traditional red light zones

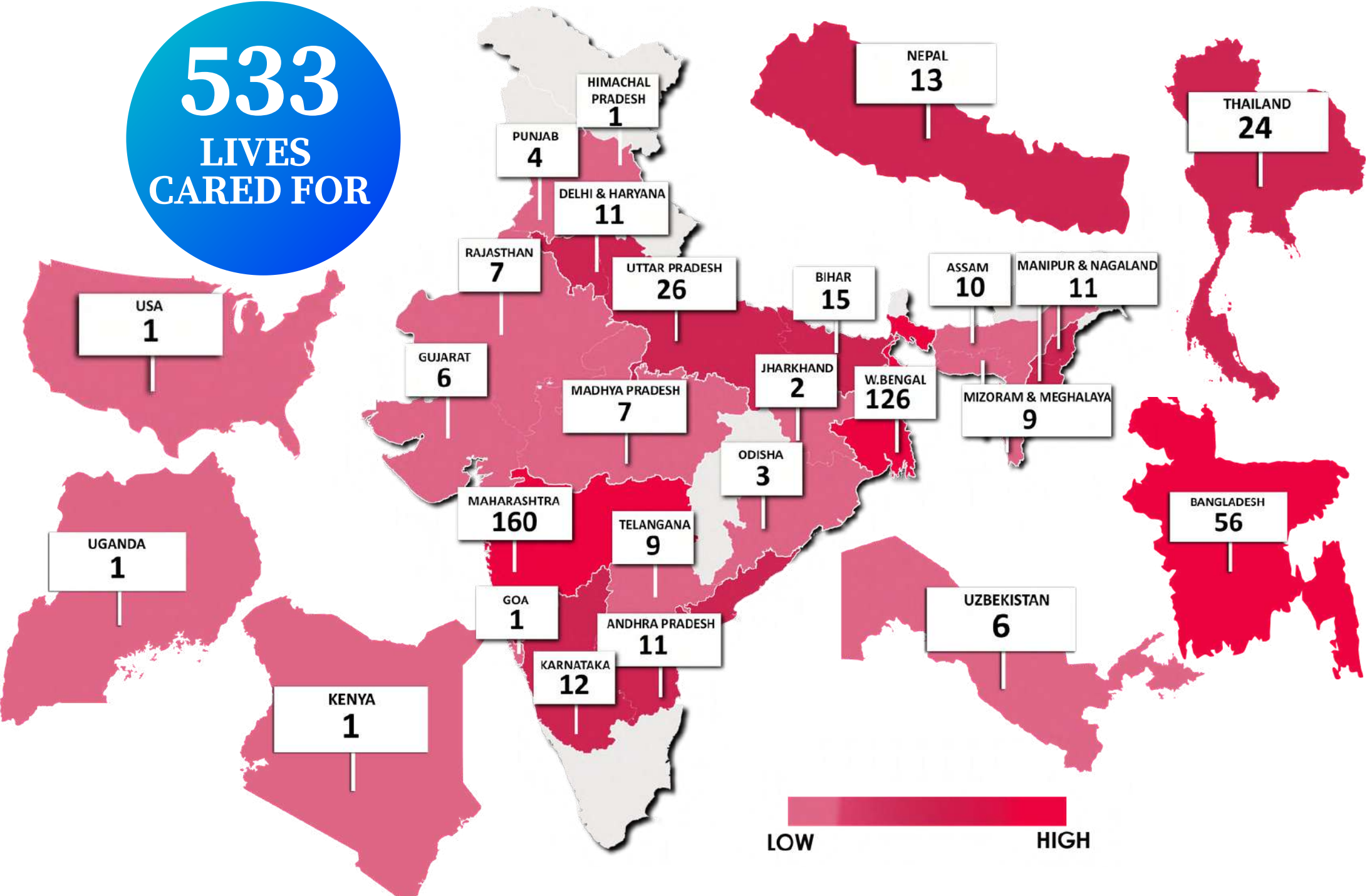
KEY CHALLENGES

- Mobile brothels/pop-up brothels and Lodge's/hotels make up over 50% of our operations.
- Traditional Red Light Areas & Brothels have gone down to 14%
- Mobile-brothels/pop-up brothels involve encrypted communications, whatsapp and phone calls, Photographs of girls are exchanged, rendezvous point for meeting is setup where a rickshaw driver brings only the selected girls along, post which girls and clients move to a nearby hotel/lodge

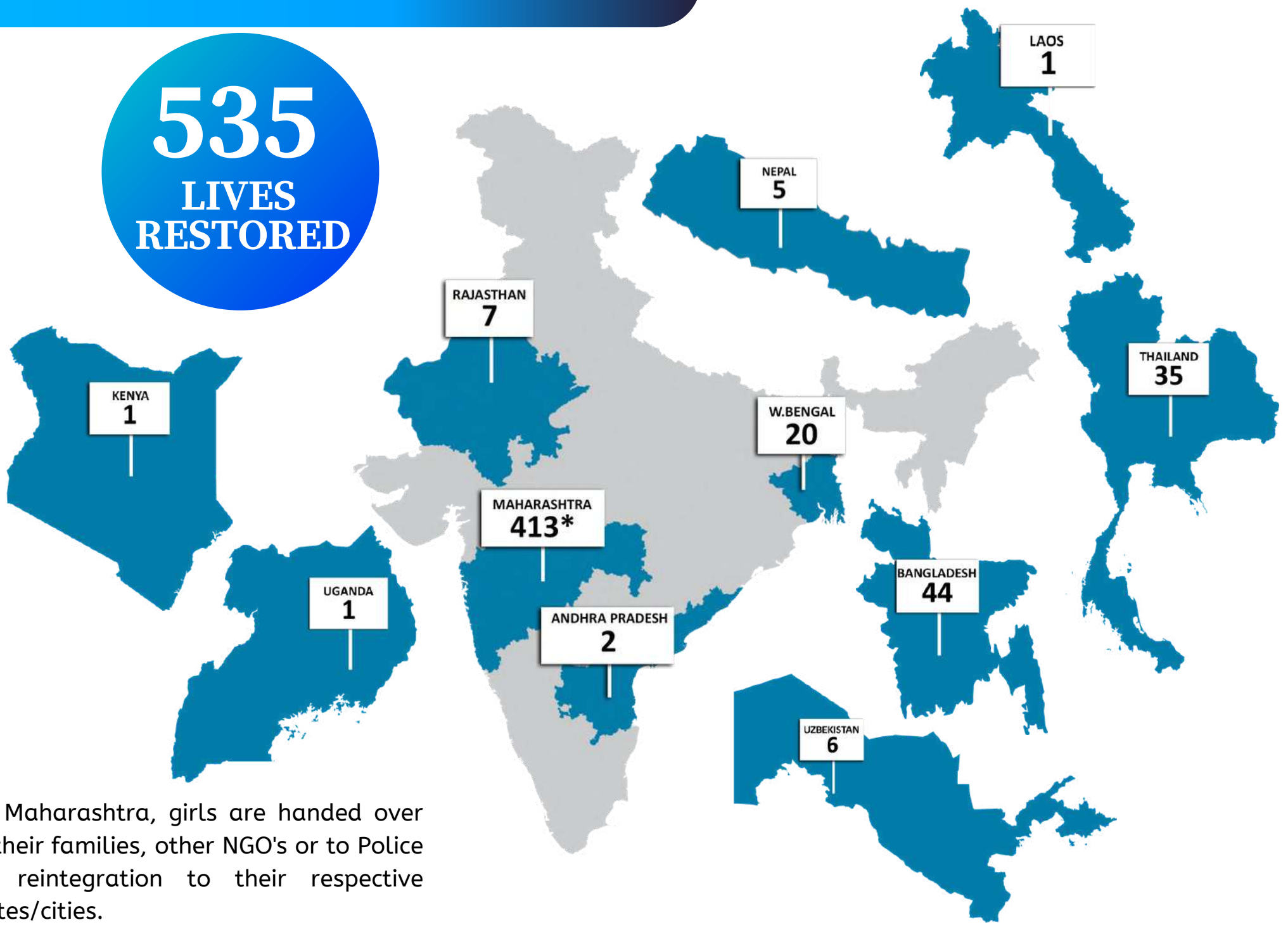
WAY FORWARD

In a shocking incident, girls as young as 12 and 13 years old, who were allegedly forced into prostitution, were rescued in a raid by the anti [human trafficking](#) unit (AHTU) of the Palghar police on Monday evening.

According to officials, the raid was conducted on the basis of a tip-off provided by a local NGO named Rescue Foundation.

“We got a tip-off from the Rescue Foundation, which is based in Boisar, that four minor girls had been trafficked and were being forced into [prostitution](#) at the Dwarka farmhouse in Kalamb, Vasai. Our officers visited the farmhouse posing as customers and after the information was verified, we moved in and raided the place,” assistant police inspector Santosh Jadhav, in charge of the Palghar AHTU, said.

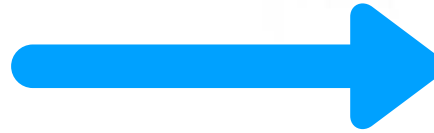

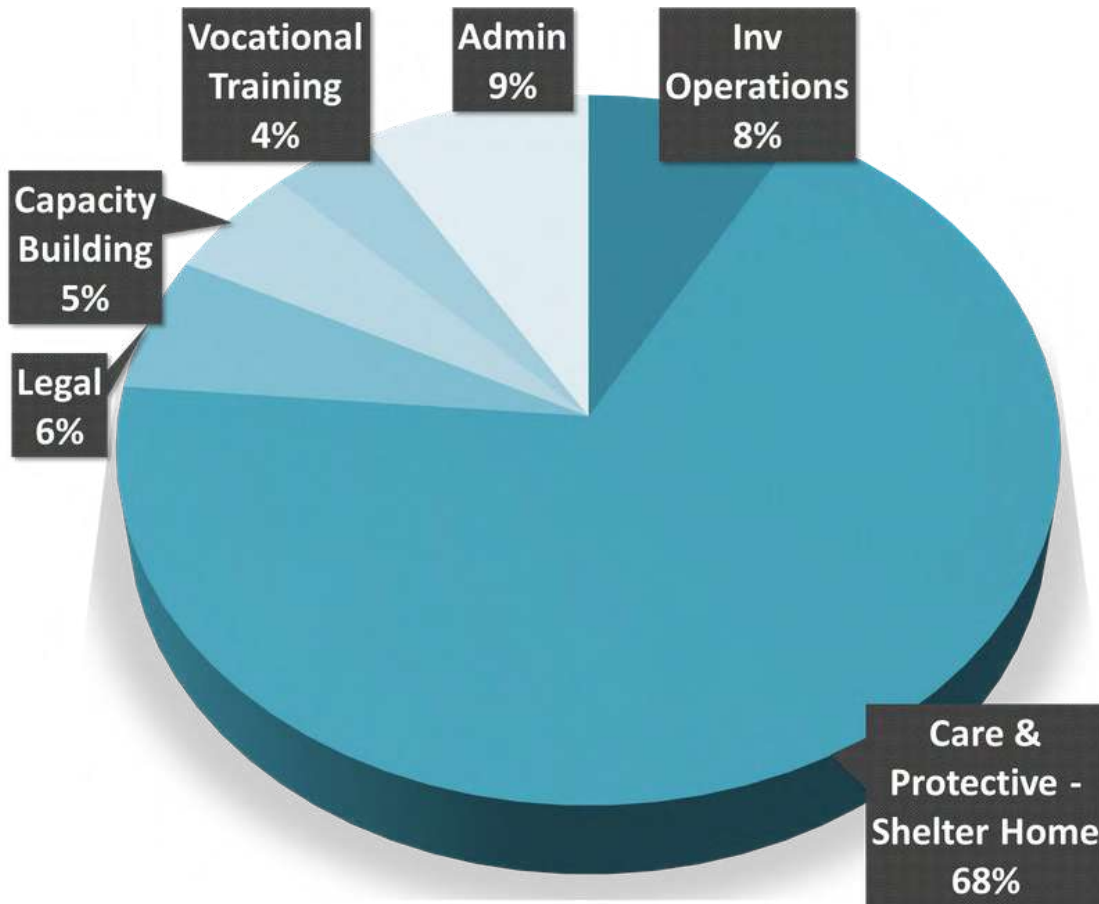
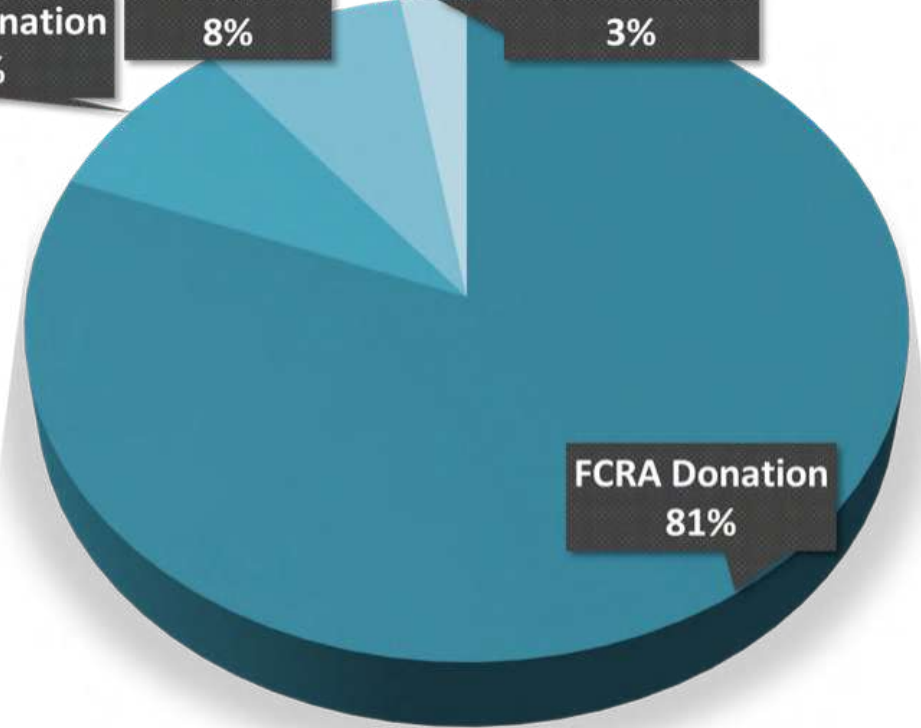
